

Corvallis UCC Stewardship 2020

- The "More Light" campaign (2021) raised pledges of \$537,346 from 122 donors
- Rental income in 2020 was down dramatically, but we planned for that
- Through July 2021, pledge income and total income are up about 6 percent over budget
- Through July 2021, expenses are about 8 percent below budget
- We have not yet had to tap into our contingency fund to balance the budget
- Planning is underway for the 2022 campaign; expect another year of "light"





First Congo at a Glance: Endowment & Memorial Funds, Evan Scheessele

The goal of the Endowment and Memorial Funds Committee's work and processes is to preserve the long-term real purchasing power of the net assets, while allowing for predictable distributions in support of the Church's mission and ministry. The Committee invests, manages, and distributes estate gifts, memorial gifts, and other special gifts not restricted to an annual time frame in order to ensure that gifts to the Church can be used to effectively fulfill the Church's mission and ministry. The Committee also administers the Church's Planned Giving Program and Pledge Continuation Fund.



Givers' inspired generosity enabled our committee's managed funds to support, in 2020, the new commercial freezer for Gatton Hall, lighted security bollards for the church's entrance, and asbestos abatement in the church's sanctuary.
